BECOME PART OF HISTORY

Today, an essential aspect of the operation of St. Luke's Historic Church & Museum is the sales, management, and maintenance of our cemeteries. Over the centuries our current campus has developed to include a number of graveyards, burial grounds, and cemeteries.

Ground Penetrating Radar suggests the existence of burials concentrated around the ancient church building that may date to as early as the late 17th century. Our earliest marked grave is 1767 but many family lots surround St. Luke's Historic Church with dates from the 1800s and 1900s.

As the twentieth century dawned, J. L. Bullock began selling parts of his farmland to the south of the ancient church building as a cemetery for the members of Benn's United Methodist Church, of which he was a member.

In the early 1930's, St. Luke's Memorial Park opened as a commercial cemetery for Isle of Wight County. After this cemetery changed hands several times, it came to be maintained by St. Luke's staff in the 1970's. As burial practices began to change, a Columbarium was built to accommodate those who desire to be cremated in 2007.

The twenty-first century brought further developments as a limited number of spaces located to the south of the church building were surveyed and marked available for sale.

It wasn't until January of 2018 that all the cemeteries were officially consolidated as part of Historic St. Luke's Restoration, a non-profit Virginia Corporation doing business as St. Luke's Historic Church & Museum.

The land immediately surrounding Virginia's Oldest Church has become the location that generations of Virginians have sought for comfort and consolation. After walking our grounds, many have commented that they feel a sense of peace and serenity in this place, surrounded by pines and a smattering of walnut, magnolia, persimmon, and oak trees.

The Cemeteries at St. Luke's Historic Church & Museum boast history that spans four centuries, but our history is incomplete. There is still room for you to Become Part of History.
